## **Asking Challenging Questions**

Asking good questions is an effective teaching method and can make your students' learning experience more meaningful. Ask questions of your learners that are engaging, arouse their curiosity about the topic, capture their imagination and challenge them to think critically.

Use the following table as a guide.<sup>1</sup> If a learner has trouble answering a question at the higher levels of the taxonomy, try asking it at a lower level and leading them to a higher level.
